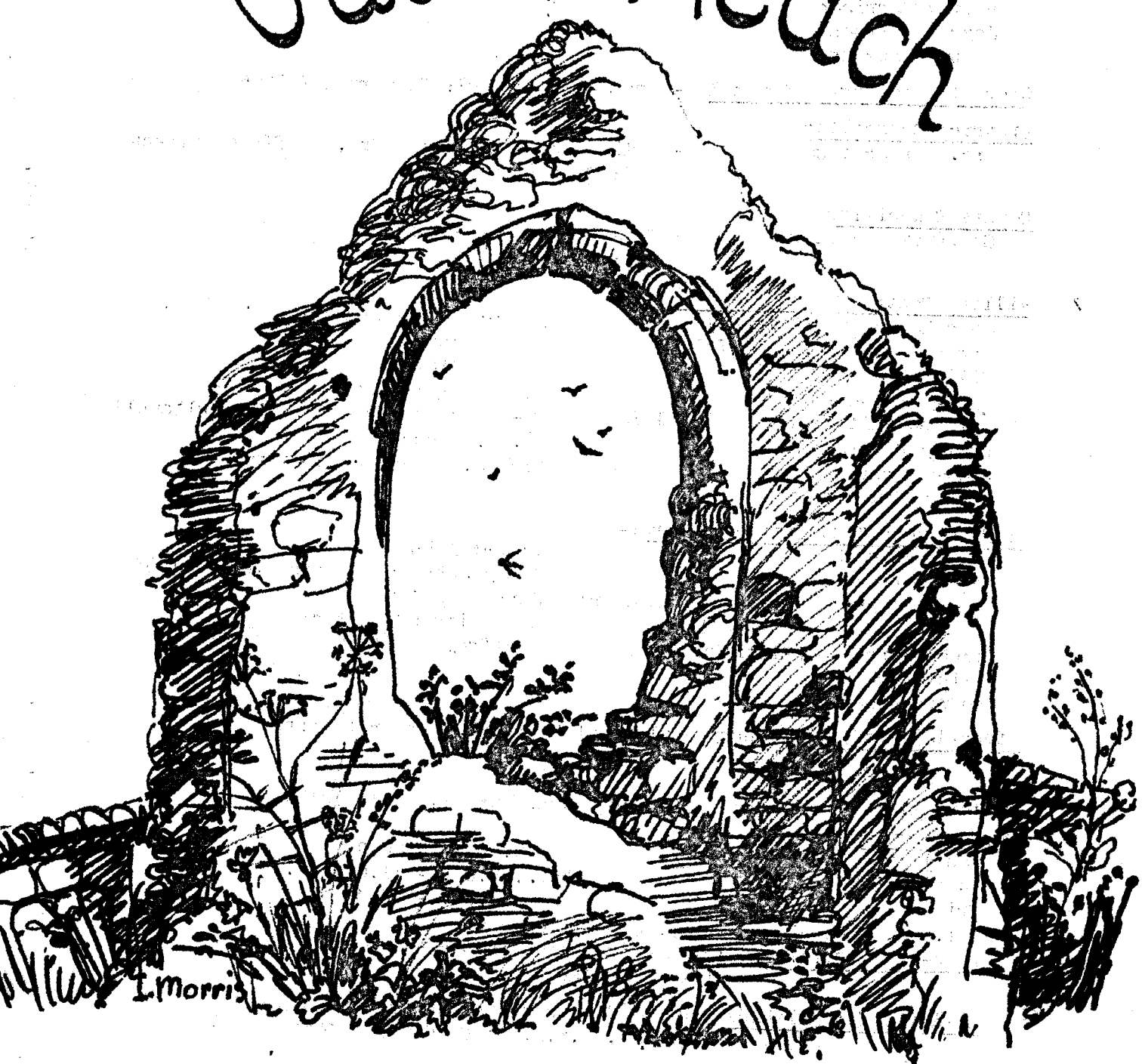

## EDITORIAL

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

During the April meeting, concern was expressed at the number of dogs allowed to roam the village, both during the day and night. Your attention is drawn to the special notice printed below.

As you will know, April was the month for the Annual General Meeting. On this occasion seven members of the public attended. The Chairman gave a comprehensive report of last year's activities and the Financial Report for 1978/79 was adopted.

Mrs. Cook, District Councillor, reported that she had been returned, unopposed, and would continue to represent the interests of Reach. In her annual report she made particular reference to the aged and lonely persons and the need for the more able-bodied to be aware of their situation. Perhaps one could find time to just 'pop in' and have a casual chat - there is much to be learnt from such conversations with the older generation.

Mr. Woollard, County Councillor, chose to speak about the Easter present most of us received on Good Friday (!) - rates. He informed the meeting of the new rate, a rise to 87 pence in the £. He also emphasised that we must not sit back and complacently accept these regular large increases.

FROM THE VICAR:

The Centenary

You may like to have the arrangements for the 10th Centenary in good time. We shall be celebrating it on Sunday, 3rd June with a Eucharist at 10.00.a.m. and Evensong at 6.30 in St. Mary's. The Bishop will be our Preacher at the Eucharist and will bless the glass screen, which we hope will be in position by then in the nave arch. I hope you will feel it is a real addition to the beauty as well as the comfort of the place.

At the request of the other clergy of the Deanery we are inviting the congregations of all its parishes to join us at 10.00.a.m so it is likely to be a fairly big occasion, and I ask you to do your best to make our visitors welcome. Light refreshments will be served in the Village Hall afterwards.

At Evensong we shall be joined by the choir and a number of the congregation of St. Augustine's, Wisbech, and my predecessor, Robin Ellis, has very kindly agreed to be the Preacher. We shall be entertaining them beforehand, at about 4.00.p.m. in the Village Hall. You are very welcome to join us but in view of the high cost of refreshments, these days, it would be appreciated if you would bring along a small offering of cakes or biscuits for the occasion.

Deanery Evensongs

These have proved enjoyable occasions over the past three years, even inspiring, and certainly an appropriate and sensible way of expressing and fostering the common life of the Deanery. Three have been arranged for the coming Summer: at Kennett on May 13th, at which the Preacher will be Deaconess Gill Lurie; June 10th at Isleham, this particular occasion being observed as our Deanery Choir Festival; and at Swaffham Bulbeck on July 8th at 6.30.p.m. in each case.

Quiet Day

The students of Ridley Hall in Cambridge will be repeating their experiment of two years ago, of keeping a Quiet Day here with their wives and families on Sunday June 10th. They will be eating in the Village Hall, and using both Churches for prayer, addresses and quietness from 11.00 till 4.00.p.m. Again, I hope you will make them feel welcome if you meet them.

Finance

We have just been obliged to withdraw £250 from our reserves in order to meet insurance premiums and a fresh supply of heating oil. In addition our diocesan Quota has risen from £476 to £566, no small sum for a tiny congregation. On the other hand, I feel it only right to explain what most parishioners are unaware of, the fact that the parish receives back just over £2500 for

the upkeep of the clergy and the vicarage. So I must ask you once again to review your giving in the light of all circumstances, and to make sure it is as generous as conscience dictates. I am very grateful for your generosity in meeting our needs so far, and particularly for an anonymous gift of £50 to our funds just before Easter.

The Churchyard

In view of the fact that all those who look after this fairly extensive piece of ground are now on the threshold of the thrombosis age, we have felt it right to raid our reserves still further to purchase a self-propelled rotary cutter; so if you feel you could let us have a donation for the preservation of this village amenity, we should indeed be grateful.

Children

Mrs. Houston's letter in our last issue raises a question which has been much on our mind for a long time, namely the lack of proper provision for children's worship. In the light of it, therefore, you may wish to know that Miss Whitehead, the former Postmistress of Reach, runs a small Sunday School in the church there each Sunday at 10.30 for half an hour. It is not generally realised that our two villages are now regarded as a single parish by the diocesan authorities, and it would be good if, wherever possible, we could think and act like one. My point is that if it is natural for children to travel every day from Reach to school in Swaffham Prior, there should be no difficulty in young children wishing to worship being taken to Reach on a Sunday morning. Incidentally, the little church there has the great advantage of being small, homely, informal, and much more heatable than St. Mary's, in fact ideal for the kind of teaching and worship children need; and we are very grateful indeed to Miss Whitehead for this valuable service she performs. She asks me to say she does not regard her work as a monopoly and would welcome help from any teenager or adult who feels called to this kind of service to Christ.

I realise that this is not what some of you with young children actually have in mind, however, so we shall go on thinking round the problem, in the hope of reaching some solution.

Tuesday Club

Would you please note that the old Monday Club which met in the Village Hall on Monday evenings has now moved its night to Tuesday, and its place of meeting to the School, through the kindness of Mrs. Booton. It has also been split into two groups, children up to 11 meeting from 6.15-7.15.p.m. and over 11s from 7.30.-9.00.p.m.

SHIRE HALL TITBITS

Occasionally - very occasionally - a nonsensical idea emerges from Shire Hall, and I want to comment on one such in this month's Out of Reach.

In order to tidy up or rationalise fire cover in this area, it is proposed to build a new Fire Station at Burwell costing at least £80,000, excluding running and manning expenses. As most residents of Reach will probably know, we are at present covered by the volunteers based at Swaffham Bulbeck Fire Station at night and Messrs. Tillotsons Corrugated Cases Ltd. during the day, backed up by the full-time firemen from Cambridge and Newmarket. This arrangement is certainly unusual and, I understand, unique in our County, but most importantly of all, it works and works well. I therefore wish to see no change in our present happy arrangements, and from discussions that I have had with Fire Sub-Officer Alan Irons, the management of Messrs. Tillotsons and a very senior official of the Fire Brigades Union, it would seem that my view commands unanimous support. I hope, therefore, that when residents of Reach hear any more of this idea which smacks of spending for spending's sake, they will make their views known in no uncertain terms to both me and higher authorities in the Fire and Rescue Services. We have good cause in this locality to be grateful for the generous co-operation between industry and community that has provided us with such excellent security over the years. I might add that Mr. Irons recently received a long service and good conduct medal for twenty years exemplary service as a volunteer fireman.

I know that Parish Council Elections are almost upon us, and I mustn't be seen to favour one Candidate or another, but I would like to express sincere gratitude to all members of your outgoing Parish Council for their kind co-operation and continuing friendship towards me as your County Councillor. It is sometimes alleged that the various tiers of Local Government are at one another's throats. I can state with the utmost certainty that as far as our locality is concerned, we all work together in constructive harmony.

#### "The Reach Survey - the Follow-up"

A large majority of the people living in Reach wish the members of the Parish Council to carry out their clearly expressed wishes as shown in the Reach Survey. Therefore, what have the Councillors in particular to do in terms of the majority views expressed in that report?

#### For "Immediate Action"

1. Arrange a programme of frequent grass cutting on the green, and rubbish clearance with the District Council.
2. Without delay arrange the fitting of traffic mirrors and a one-way traffic signal at Bull Cottage Corner.
3. At once arrange the restricted access of lorries into the village except for delivery or collection.
4. This Spring, plant more trees, especially along the roads into the village.
5. By the summer have a senior citizens seat and shade tree on the green.

#### Principles for the future conduct of Affairs

- A. No implementation of schemes without full consultation of one and all.
- B. Members of the Parish Council must always obtain the majority view and not just their own, plus what they think everyone else wants, or what in their view is good for people.
- C. Their duty is to maintain the village, and its quality, as expressed by the people, in face of the District and County Councils.
- D. Preserve the open spaces, footpaths, trees and rural amenities of the village.
- E. Improve the roads and pavements.

#### In NO Way!

The people of Reach must impress on the Parish Council they do not want:-

1. The projected road across the green from opposite the Senior Citizens Cottages.
2. The closure of the road bisecting the green.
3. So many and unnecessary signs around the village.
4. Sunday Markets.

This should be enough for the Councillors to get on with, but just in case they ignore it all, also they should be re-testing public opinion and be

SWAFFHAM PRIOR FEAST

The village men, or sometimes children with blackened faces, used to pull their ploughs from door to door collecting money to spend in the public houses and/or at the fair which moved on to Swaffham Prior from Reach.

This year the Feast Day falls on Saturday, 26th May. It is hoped to make this effort a Village Party divided into two parts - an afternoon entertainment and an evening entertainment.

- Music by the Wicken Coronation Band
  - Maypole Dancing
  - Various stalls (including Cake & Bottle Stalls)

  - Teas
  - Children's Fancy Dress Competition

Price of admission for ALL CLASSES will be 25p. which will include entrance to all entertainments but NOT teas.

The EVENING ENTERTAINMENT will take the form of a Village Party and will commence at 7.30.p.m. The theme will be "Victorian Times" and Fancy Dress Costumes will be judged at 8.00.p.m. This will be followed by a Barbecue - whole roasted lamb - Community Singing following from 9.00.p.m. onwards. RECIPE

SWEET AND SOUR HEART

Serves Two

- |                        |   |
|------------------------|---|
| 1 Sheeps heart         | 1 tsp. sugar                              |
| 1 large chopped onion  | 1 tsp. curry powder                       |
| 1 large clove garlic   | pinch pepper                              |
| 2 tbsp, tomato ketchup | juice of $\frac{1}{2}$ lemon              |
| 2 tbsp. vinegar        | $\frac{1}{2}$ pint stock                  |
| 1 Tbsp. Soy sauce      | 1 tbsp. flour mixed to a paste with water |

Cutheart meat into small pieces and fry with onion and sliced garlic clove. Add stock and flavouring ingredients. Mix in flour paste and stir over gentle heat until thickened. Serve with boiled rice.
