Outside Edge

The seven-strong local art group Outside Edge nearly lost their popular venue, St. Cyriacs Church, Swaffham Prior in 2016. The Churches Conservation Trust, who require substantial funds for the upkeep of historic buildings, discovered that letting St. Cyriac's out for 'Champing' (camping in Churches) proved both successful and financially rewarding.

The artists, three from Reach – Hannah Webb, Dafila Scott and Joss Goodchild, together with Exning-based Vee Wallace, Heather Maunder from Ely and Cathy Parker, Cambridge exhibit their paintings under the Cambridge Open Studios initiative. For years the beautiful light and airy Church interior has been an ideal place to showcase their artworks and attracts over 700 visitors to the region in July

Burwell Guest House for Dogs

Burwell Guest House for Dogs was established about 10 years ago by myself, Martine Mockford



I like the dogs to feel at home and rooms on the lower ground floor of my house and also a large garden are set up so that they can potter between the two. I have couches, beds and crates all individually arranged so that each dog has its own bed. I have child gates between the rooms and the garden so the dogs never feel shut in. In the morning the dogs will play around in the lawned garden for an hour or so and then come in for their breakfast. They will then play and rest in the house and garden as they please, enjoying each other's company. I have several rooms dedicated to their use and it's a home from home for the dogs.

I can take up to six dogs at a time and have five at present. I'm busy all year round and especially during the school holidays so anyone wanting to book needs to contact me well in advance. Dogs stay for a day while their owners are at work, or weeks while the owners are on holiday. Each dog will come with its own bed, food and medication, so they have a familiar scent and their individual diets are maintained.

All dogs will visit and have an assessment before they can come to stay. Part of their assessment is to judge if they get on with Poppy, my Jack Russell, she is very submissive and if a dog does not get on with her then they will not be accepted. They are also assessed to see if they are happy to be put behind a child gate. If they become anxious and stressed when put behind a gate again they cannot stay because they won't settle, particularly at night when all dogs need to be separated in accordance with the requirements of my licence and insurance. Possibly the most common reason for dogs to fail the assessment is because at home they are allowed to sleep in the owner's bedroom and they just won't settle downstairs.



That said, most dogs pass the assessment and it obviously works very well as Udo, a boxer, clearly felt at home within less than an hour of arriving.

I take dogs from all over but obviously mostly Cambridgeshire. I had visitors from the north of England who brought their dog down specifically to be assessed and then later dropped their dog off before travelling on to Standsted. One client moved to Saffron Walden and still brings their dogs to me.

I am a licensed by East Cambs District Council to 'Keep A Domestic Animal Boarding Establishment (Dogs)' and the requirements and guidelines are very strict. For example, all dogs must be fully jabbed including kennel cough and the owners must provide proof of the jabs; all male dogs over nine months must be castrated; I am required to have a fire evacuation plan; have a safe and secure environment for the dogs and other requirements including good hygiene. I am inspected annually to ensure that everything is in place.

I am fully insured, as you would expect. I have also attended a Canine Psychotherapy and Behaviour Course and a Cats and Dogs Emergency First Aid course. From the latter I can assist an unconscious dog; deal with an open wound; know what to do in the event of a heart attack, seizures and drowning; and I can resuscitate a dog!



What I like most about my work is the cuddles and the companionship of the dogs and yes, I think people definitely separate into cat lovers or dog lovers.





Walking with Saxons



On the 5th April, residents were transported back to the Saxon period, nearly 1400 years ago when Andrew Peachey of Archaeological Solutions Ltd visited the Reach Village Centre to give a talk on a high status cemetery recently excavated on Burwell Road, Exning.



Archaeologists recorded 21 well-preserved skeletons, many of which were accompanied by an array of grave goods, including jewelry, tools, a glass bowl and even a 'warrior burial' with a spear and dagger.

The burials were dated to the Conversion period or mid 7th century, when Christianity was being re-introduced to Britain, and Exning is particularly interesting historically because it is also recorded by the Venerable Bede as the birth place of St. Ethelreda, famously associated with Ely Cathedral, but also commemorated on the church at Reach. The date of these burials places them exactly at the time of Ethelreda and the status of the graves suggests these could have been noble individuals who walked alongside her. The cause of death remains a mystery as none of the skeletons were traumatically wounded but they may have experienced a severe famine.



On the left are two skeletons, possibly a mother and daughter buried together; while on the right is a gilded axe shape pendant with zoomorphic decoration. Intertwined are six animals, including two beaked birds, two four-legged animals and two further beasts...can you spot them?



Many of the finds were on display and were marveled at for their intricate craftsmanship, while several people brought along artifacts they had found to be identified including a Neolithic stone axe and 19th century pottery, complete with trade logos.

We were delighted that the event raised £265 for the Reach Riders Group



The team's aims are:

- Each year, to put together a list of village events in a Reach Village calendar containing pictures selected from those provided by villagers – the proceeds of which are ploughed back into events such as those that surround our Christmas Tree

Our most recent event – and one which the team is proud of – is the Queen's 90th Birthday Beacon Celebration which took place on the evening of Thursday 21st April 2016. On the day itself, the beacon was put in place by our friends at Snakehall Farm – this event was a huge community effort with lots of people getting involved. Again, there are pictures of their endeavours on the inside front cover of the flyer.

The beacon was lit – with no problems - for which we were all thankful. Then Ross Clark said a few words including reading out a statement produced by Prince Charles – which he did – mimicking the Prince, who I'm sure would've forgiven him. We knew Ross would be good but in fact he was bloody excellent.



The National Anthem and Happy Birthday were both sung by an audience of over 90 people. Then we toasted them with whoever's fizz we could get our hands on.

It was time capsule time now and Eva Quilter and Freddie Bridgeman stepped forward. Their names had been drawn out of a hat as a village boy and girl and they duly put the capsule into a hole dug that day by Snakehall Farm. The final action was to attach a plaque to the wall on the Village Centre.



It was a lovely event and thanks go to so many people – you know who you are – we are very grateful.

Coming up, we have a further birthday celebration for the Queen, taking place on Sunday June 12th on the Green, starting at 2.30pm and finishing at around 5.00pm.

It will take the form of a village picnic so please bring your own savoury food – and alcohol as required – we will be providing the cakes, juices and tea coffee. The Cakes, however, need to be coming from YOU – this has become a bit of a tradition now and there will be a competition to select the best. Any kind of cake is fine – but it has to be a birthday cake. Further details will be emailed out soon.

Bountiful Roses

For many, the flower which conjures up summer more than any other is the rose and it is no surprise that this quintessentially English flower frequently tops the list as the nation's favourite bloom. With a plethora of species and hybrids from which to choose, the gardener is spoilt for choice when selecting the ideal rose for their own garden. Not only are we faced with a range of colours from white and cream through to deep burgundy and shades of blue, but also with a choice of forms, ranging from vigorous bush to carpeting and climbing; scented; species or hybrid; traditional or modern; and fruit bearing or not.

There are many gardens which incorporate roses, all of which act as a source of inspiration for the gardener. While soaking up the spectacle and heady aroma of a rose garden, how many of us pause to consider the origin of this popular flower? In our own Rose Garden here at the Botanic Garden, the display is arranged to present the complex history of the garden rose.

Much of the history and development of the rose was carried out here in the Garden by Charles Hurst the 1930's. The Rose Garden was subsequently designed in the 1980's by the renowned horticulturist, Graham Stuart Thomas, to demonstrate Hurst's work. Starting with ancestral European roses, the beds chart the history of extensive hybridisation of European and Chinese species roses. These have given rise to many of the garden roses with which we are now so familiar.

Our Garden includes a diverse range of plants, from the European species such as *Rosa gallica*, through to Chinese introductions such as the impressive, mound-forming *R. soulieana*. *R.* 'Burgundy Ice' is a selection of a modern floribunda; 'Felicite et Perpetue', among others, represents the climbing roses; and 'Graham Thomas', provides an example of the modern English Rose. The Rose Garden, with its history, diversity of form, colour and season of interest, combined with herbaceous underplantings and heady scent, brings a reminder not only of the typical English country garden, but also of the valuable role of research and

hybridisation in our gardens. Whatever your reason for including roses in the garden, now is the time to enjoy them at their best.

Out and About

The early hot and sunny days of May, sandwiched between rainy spells, have resulted in a flush of vegetation. The rapidly growing stems and white umbrellas of cow parsley suddenly stand 10ft high along roadside verges.



One of the aspects I like most about our country is that a run of stiflingly hot weather is invariably broken shortly afterwards by fresher temperatures. One day cloudless blue skies, warm breezes and cracked earth, the next hailstone-sized raindrops and tearing winds. In and around Reach the season seems characterised by the sound of ewes and lambs, skylarks, bees and birdsong, clouds of blossom, wild flowers and hedges that shelter nesting birds.

In our garden blackbirds hatch a second brood, their nest precariously built above the blue tit box (empty this year). A family of robins flit about and boldly watch our gardening antics from a distance of just a few feet; I read they sing to defend territories, fight to the death but also feed injured opponents. We counted 11 different bird species on/around the feeders one morning, reward for the purchase of Birds & Bees seed rather than the usual inexpensive alternative.

A flock of yellowhammers inhabit Aves' hedge (a sparrowhawk hunts them) and goldfinches frequent the one running beside Churchfield Farm, the air full of their liquid chirrupings. Four buzzards regularly ride the thermals above Tubney Fen. Bats can be seen in Great Lane at dusk. Green woodpeckers can be heard near Reach Wood, kestrels also.

Whilst Steve Munden's cows are corralled I've been walking the top bank behind Duckett's Farm, just before Upware. This picturesque route offers long views and a lovely path of short cropped grass bordering washland. A wide variety of waterfowl can be seen within minutes i.e. wigeon, cormorants, lapwing, greylag and Canada geese, mute swans, shoveller, great crested and little grebe, coot, tufted duck, three pairs avocet, redshank and mallard. There's a parking space below the bank and entry gate/signage for enthusiasts.

Villagers have been in touch with interesting sightings, thank you – keep them coming:

Ron advises that Joe The Crow, who favours the village and has visited his garden for several months for feed, now also inhabits the village green and tree. Clearly identified by his black and white plumage he is tamer than most and has become a Reach resident. We're hoping he stays safe.

- 3.4 Ron saw two swallows on the meadow near his sheep field.
- 12.4 Tracy was thrilled to note swallows nesting in their stables, their 16th year at least. Also a robin collecting nesting material (horses' shed coat), blue tits and blackbirds in the garden. The following day she watched a barn owl quartering the wheat field at Springhall Farm.
- 17.4 Hilary heard her first cuckoo from the stableyard. Tracy saw a buzzard perched on Ron's fence watching lambs and noted butterflies aplenty.
- 4.5 Ron and Penny observed four swifts in the village.
- 5.5 Claire Acklam heard a cuckoo and a day later reported 'brand new cygnets on the lode, must be hours old'. She later updated 'cygnets out on first trip, nine of them, adorable'
- 10.5 Rosie Almond mentioned she had seen a stoat crossing the road by Wilmott's Farm and noticed several jays in their Great Lane garden.
- 11.5 Penny had a surprise when she spotted a pencil-thin grass snake sunning itself in the gap under their front door. Ron mentioned that Sue, their neighbour, has a huge frog in her pond.

Rebecca Fordham advised they regularly see a barn owl at the bottom of their property, High Cloud on the Burwell Road. The family are also about to take possession of two llamas! Look forward to hearing further news about these exotic newcomers.

Robert Keutgen walked Percy across Pocket Park recently and heard a loud splash from the lode, he went over to investigate and saw a group of six cormorants fishing.

Gareth Davies emailed: 'not a huge amount to report, though common cranes regularly being seen around Wicken now.

Robert Wood has found two dead birds in the last couple of weeks, both with rings on. I've chased up the details with the BTO. The first, unfortunately, was a barn owl which may have collided with a building. It was an eight year old male, having been ringed as a chick in Soham on 31st July 2008. The second was a pied wagtail, born in 2015 and ringed at Wicken Fen in December last year. Cause of death unknown.

I'd be very interested in hearing from anyone in the village who finds or sees a ringed bird. There's lots of information about the importance to conservation of data gathered by ringing on the BTO website at <http://www.bto.org/volunteer-surveys/ringing> and found rings can be reported at www.ring.ac.

Hilary emailed: 'Cuckoo heard at stables. Love the shelduck (x4) at Aves's forage pile. Never seen them there before. Have green woodpeckers nesting in broken willow again this year, but disappointing number of swallows returned. I do have a couple of pairs of nesting Pied wagtails again this year. Have had flock of long tailed tits on my seed feeder at the stables and a regular lesser spotted woodpecker on the nuts. A determined female black bird has finally given up trying to build her nest in the engine compartment of my horsebox. I have had to remove half a dozen beautifully constructed nests over the last few weeks, sadly one with two eggs in it'.

In closing, a salutary tale for those of us who move areas of temporary electric stock fencing. Recently, a friend was pulling up a plastic fence stake in her paddock, it was stuck fast and she leaned over to tug harder. Suddenly it relented and, in flying upwards, hit her squarely in the eye causing lasting damage. Please beware!



The fruit plants will take some time to establish but we hope to extend our range of Prospects Preserves with these new crops. We will report back on the project in the next newsletter but thank you once again to all those who voted for us.

FILLING THE HUNGRY GAP

You may have noticed that during the winter months we frequently stock produce from other local organic farms and suppliers in our onsite farm shop. The reason for this is what is known as the 'hungry gap'. We grow a large variety of vegetables between April and October and some crops can be stored in order to keep selling them over the winter (e.g. potatoes and onions). However, without having expensively heated greenhouses we cannot grow much to harvest fresh over the winter. We do grow winter lettuces, purple-sprouting broccoli and leeks which continue to grow over the winter. There is always a period of a few weeks when these crops have finished and the new season crops have not yet produced enough to start harvesting. So in order to keep the shop stocked we have to buy from other suppliers. We are always reviewing what we grow and endeavour to keep trying new crops that may extend our season. Tell us what is your top pick of our crop—we love to hear from our customers.



TEAM BUILDING WITH A DIFFERENCE AT SNAKEHALL FARM

We are very proud to be hosting three group volunteer days at Snakehall Farm during 2016. Group volunteers come from socially responsible companies, where up to 15 employees volunteer for a day at charities like ourselves to help repair, build or refurbish the farm to generally make it a better place for our Co-workers.

The volunteering days are invaluable to us as we will have a specific task for the group to work on which we would otherwise struggle to do as our time is mostly taken up by supporting our Co-workers. Previous groups (comprising of bankers, salespeople, solicitors and IT developers) have built woodsheds, cut hedges, planted garlic, tidied up our barns, refurbished our packing room, built deer fencing and re-built our composting area.

These days not only benefit us, but the companies too. They provide opportunities for employees to build bonds with colleagues, work outdoors, learn new skills and try their hand at something new. It is really good to know that not only do we make a difference to the lives of those with disabilities and their support networks, but can also make an impact on the profit-driven corporate world, even if it is just for a day. Fruits of our Orchard

Featured Fruits

I could find out very little about the three varieties featured in this issue. They are all local to our area, and the descriptions below come from the website of the East of England Apples and Orchards Project (EEAOP). If you have more information please let me know.



Johnny Mount Pear

A variety local to Essex, known around Colchester but exact place of origin not known. A medium-sized, russet pear. A heavy cropper best eaten near Christmas. First recorded pre-1900.

We have four trees in the orchard, only one of which is currently sponsored, by Andrew Trump.

Jolly Miller

A cooking apple described as 'once popular in the Cottenham area. Possibly named after the village Public House of the same name where fruit was once traded. A medium-sized tall apple with a greasy yellow skin, reddish flush and broken red stripes. First recorded 1883. Best picked late September, and used September to October.

We have two trees in the orchard, one of which is sponsored, by Helen Oliver.



Lady Hollendale

Probably arose in the Cambridgeshire, Lincolnshire or Norfolk Fens since it was being grown for the Wisbech fruit markets in the 1920-30s. An early season crisp and juicy red apple, best picked and eaten in August.

We have three trees in the orchard, one sponsored by Juliet Vickery and another by Millie Crawford (via Grahame Radford and Karen Carpenter).

Gardening Day

Orchards need pretty constant care and attention – for which we depend on volunteers. It isn't hard or technically complex work, and we choose days when the weather is fine. Many hands make light work and most of the tasks are finished within an hour. In April we did some 'gardening' around the orchard – giving the trees a feed of fish, blood and bone meal, and weeding around their bases (see the photos). If you are interested in helping out occasionally, and aren't already on the 'orchard' email list, please send an email to david.thomas2000@yahoo.co.uk.

Voiles

On the gardening day we noticed that most of the trees had voles burrowing under the mulch mats and around the roots. Consulting the East of England Apple and Orchards Project we learnt that "*voles gnaw the rind form apple tree roots if they can get access to the roots ... voles have proved to be the very worst pest of young trees, simply because they love mulch mats surrounded by long grass ... At 3 years, the root systems of your trees may be deep enough to be able to discard the mulch mats without adverse effect.*". Oh dear... So, we rapidly organised another work party (thanks to all those that turned out at short notice) and have taken up the mats. We are now contemplating what to do next, but mowing the grass short, and applying a mulch around the trees seems like a likely option. So please keep a look out for a notice requesting volunteers with barrows!

Blossom

By the time this edition of Within Reach goes out some of the fruit trees may still be in bloom. If you sponsored a tree, why not take a walk down to the orchard to see if it is flowering?

Most of the cherry trees are likely to have finished flowering, and of course the fruit-bearing cultivars in the orchard are not nearly as showy as the ornamentals common in people's gardens and lining the streets of towns. But hopefully in 20 years from now villagers from Reach will be able to venture down to the 24Acre to sit and picnic under the trees. In Japan, picnicking under blooming trees is a centuries-old practice called "*hanami*". The custom was originally limited to the elite of the Imperial Court, but soon spread to samurai society and, then to the common people as well. Every year the Japanese Meteorological Agency and the public track the *sakura zensen* (cherry blossom front) as it moves northward up the archipelago with the approach of warmer weather. *Hanami* festivals celebrate the beauty of the cherry blossom and for many are a chance to relax and enjoy the beautiful view.

Meadows Day

On the 2nd and 3rd July (see the separate poster in this issue) the National Trust is organising a mini BioBlitz on the 24Acre. This should be a lot of fun, and we need as many people as possible to come and learn about the wildlife on the site and help us to discover what is there.

Wicken Fen and Anglesey Abbey News

It was with great sadness that we learnt of the sudden death of former Warden, Ralph Sargent, who many readers will remember from working, volunteering or simply visiting Wicken Fen.



Ralph was a Warden at Wicken for 35 years retiring in 2007. The very next day he was back at the Fen as a volunteer. With his distinctive hair and beard he was an iconic figure who spent much of his day at the fen, binoculars in hand scanning the fen and skies for wildlife, big or small, rare or common, he loved it all. He will be greatly missed by all staff, volunteers and the many visitors who stopped to have a chat with him.

The Wicken rangers are helping to run a mini Bio-Blitz on the Reach 24 Acres site on Saturday & Sunday 3-4 July. On Saturday evening (8 – 10pm) we will be setting small mammal traps, listening out for bats and moth trapping. On the Sunday (8am – 1pm) we will be opening the mammal traps, and searching for bugs, birds, butterflies and plants.

For the forthcoming half-term we have **Den Building** on Wednesday 1 June and **Go Wild: All about fire** on Friday 3 June. Details of all our events (including summer holiday events) and booking arrangements can be found on our website at www.nationaltrust.org.uk/wicken-fen - please book early to avoid disappointment.

This year we are marking the 50th anniversary of Lord Fairhaven's death and his bequest of Anglesey Abbey to the National Trust.

The House team have put together a fantastic series of exhibitions throughout the summer focusing on various aspects of Lord Fairhaven's life and interests. In June, the focus is Lord Fairhaven's family, his up-bringing in America and the family move back to England. Featuring photo albums, books, letters & watercolours not normally on public display, the exhibition throws up little interesting nuggets, such as – his grandfather H.H.Rogers was a close friend of Mark Twain and saved him from bankruptcy, or Lord Fairhaven was asked to be an usher at the marriage of Mary, Princess Royal in 1922.

As part of the Trust's new art programme we have commissioned a piece of contemporary art which will appear in the garden in early June. The artist, Caroline Wright, has taken inspiration from Lord Fairhaven's interest in ornithology to create a giant bird cage, large enough for a family to get inside, which will be located in the wildflower meadows. Drawing on Lord Fairhaven's design skills and ambitions to create views and vistas around the gardens, the bird cage should create new views both for those in the cage and those viewing it from around the gardens.

Tales from a Reach Garden

Richard has been replacing some of the planks on the raised beds where we grow our vegetables. We first created the raised beds in late 2007/early 2008, so they've lasted at least 8 years. Almost constant rain from the end of August last year finally finished them off and many planks rotted. About half of the beds needed repairing immediately, but the others will have to wait now that the growing season has started in earnest. Our broad beans, potatoes, garlic, onions and peas have been planted. I usually plant a couple of rows of peas each month up to the end of June. This is known as 'succession sowing' to avoid a sudden glut or dearth of peas, so that we have a constant supply during the summer.

In addition to sowing seeds, I've spent much of the past two months weeding in various places around the garden. Many annual weeds can be hoed before they become too large or easily pulled up from the well-worked soil of the vegetable plot, or well-mulched flower beds. The annual battle with toxic cuckoo pint (*Arum Maculatum*) and its equally-poisonous ornamental cousin *Arum Italicum Pictum* is in full swing. The latter was planted in our garden by previous owners, or sown by local birds. Occasionally, I have to pull up *Arum Italicum* from vegetable beds – I have learnt what the seedling looks like and it always gives me a little thrill when the tiny seedling comes up with bulb intact (yay!)

Another weed that we struggle to clear is ground-elder, which was probably first introduced to Britain by the Romans as a pot herb and used by Medieval herbalists in a balm for gout gradually falling out of favour as one Tudor herbalist complained that it spread "to the annoyance of better herbes". However, unlike the *Arum*, we've never had to pull it up from the vegetable beds, even though a clump of ground elder is permanently resident under the tap we use for watering our vegetables. Each year I spot treat that clump with weed killer or dig up the underground stems and it seems to be clear for the rest of the year, only to reappear the following spring... We've other clumps of ground-elder in the garden, which tend to be in herbaceous borders in shady areas, where the underground stems worm their way around the roots of other plants. There is a variegated version of ground-elder sold in garden centres as "*Aegopodium Podagraria*" (the botanical latin name for ground-elder), which needs to be planted in full sun, otherwise it will revert to its green, spreading, ineradicable parent. Personally, I wouldn't risk planting it, considering how dull and damp our summers can be, though I suspect that previous owners of our garden did just that. I suppose I'll have to do what the Romans did: cook it like spinach and eat it - but without the weed killer flavouring.

Sage

Mint is a herb which people tell you not to plant in a border because it is invasive. I have a couple of pots of mint on the patio, but there is also a spearmint patch in our garden, which came with the house and which the chickens kept under control, pecking its leaves as soon as they appeared above ground. It only grew beyond the fence of the chicken run, out of reach of hungry beaks and restricted by a low brick wall. Our hens clearly had a taste for mint, but now they've gone the mint has returned and has to be restricted. We have another patch which my son planted (he said he likes mint) and this is easier to control. Mint is indeed a spreading plant, but compared to ground-elder it is easier to deal with. It's just less hassle not to have to keep it in check.

Most herbs in our garden are in pots on the patio or in flower beds, grown as much for their foliage and flowers as for their aroma. I don't tend to grow herbs in the vegetable plot because I prefer to have them closer to the house. The only exception has been parsley because it needs a rich moisture-retentive soil to do well and the vegetable plot is the best place for it as it is watered regularly along with the vegetables. Parsley is a biennial plant, i.e. it puts flowers out in the second year of growth after sowing. I've grown it as an annual for its leaves, pulling it up the following spring before the flowers are formed.

For success in growing parsley it's best to sow the washed (and still damp) seeds in moist soil and keep it watered, though not too sodden. Mediterranean herbs, such as bay laurel, fennel, rosemary, oregano, marjoram and thyme, need to be planted in a sunny position in well-drained soil to do well. If planted in a shady spot they will tend to become lanky and flop over in the search for sunshine. One exception in our garden has been sage which is growing in a border by the north side of the house and has done well there for at least five years. Oregano, marjoram, fennel and lemon balm tend to self-seed around the garden after flowering, so I dig them up the plantlets whenever I find they have moved away from 'home'. The flowers of many herbs attract all sorts of butterflies, bees and hoverflies. So even if you're not fond of the flavour of herbs, many are worth growing because they attract beneficial insects to the garden.

Meeting Derek and Yvonne Coombes



Ibiza

Yvonne My name is Yvonne Mary Coombes. My father knew someone called Yvonne; he also knew someone called Yvette but my mother said that was too French. Mary is a family name. I was brought up in Fordham and went to Fordham Junior School which now no longer exists. I then went to Burwell Secondary School. I hated school. It was too academic and I was sporty. I was definitely not teacher's pet! I did some sport at my senior school: netball and tennis, and I was selected at county level for the high jump, long jump, and hurdle.

There was one teacher I liked which funnily no one else did. She was very strict and her name was Miss Wolf, a spinster. She taught English Literature and I learnt a lot from her. I liked reading and still do.

I went to work in a shop at aged 15 and a half. That seems funny now as my granddaughter is the same age and is just choosing what college she will attend. Nowadays there's university, a year out, travelling etc before work commences. The shop I worked at was in Fordham, The Co-op. I liked it and undertook general tasks. I got to go out on a bike and collect orders, which I enjoyed because I liked being outside. My other jobs were working in a transistor factory in Newmarket where I undertook quality control.

I was very fashionable when I was young, more clothes-wise. My mother was a first class dress maker and made my clothes. I could see a trouser suit in Vogue and my mother would make it for me. I had outfits before they were in the shops! My mother also made handmade lace.

I was a rock chick. I liked all the Led Zepplin stuff and still listen to the music which has come through to today. I still have the tapes. I like the Rolling Stones and Black Sabbath. If you could bang it, I liked it. I went to concerts; Bill Hayley in London and I saw him several times. I went to see the Stones and Cilla Black. Derek and I were both young in the 60s and reckon it was the best time ever.

Derek My name is Derek Geoffrey Coombes and I come from a big family. I'm in the middle and thought my name was 'ere you, when I was very young. I was born in Newmarket and went to Exning Road Primary School and Newmarket Secondary Modern. School was a non-event for me. The teachers were over strict.

One of the worst was Smithy who would come into the classroom, read a newspaper, and walk out without a word. The teachers were just not interested.

It was post war and things were very disorganised. After school I got called up to the air force and was a wireless engineer; from there my education began and my life took off. It was 1955 and I was aged 17 years.

I was sent on a course in Wiltshire to study and it was brilliant. It wasn't the done thing to volunteer but I volunteered to do an extra attachment, to attend an extra course at Stadishall. I especially liked it because I could travel home easily from RAF Stadishall. The additional course was the best thing because I gained an expertise that no one else had or wanted, and with this, I travelled to the Middle East and all over. The expertise was VHFDF, a detective function for aircraft used when radar was not practical.



Wedding Day, Fordham

An incident occurred which caused me to end up marooned on an island. It was just pre the Suez crisis and we were ferrying (Venom) aircraft to Aden that was a great distance away. The government owned a sand bank in the middle of the Red Sea and four of us were dropped on to the island to transit the aircraft through.

Four aircraft were to be moved secretly each day, for three days, and the first aircraft got through just fine. It then rained and the island virtually sank. To those in charge we were just a dot on a map on a wall, and we were forgotten about and left to fend for ourselves. We shot gazelle but I couldn't eat it. Eventually we got the air/ground radio equipment to work and took it in turns to send out Mayday calls. A civil aircraft finally heard us and arranged for a food drop and for help to be sent. After a bit a big battleship, HMS Kenya, turned up off the beach, and a small boat came ashore and took us off.

I was in Yemen for four years on various jobs. I met Yvonne and come out of the air force, aged 21years old.

Yvonne We met at a dance in Newmarket. I danced, he did not!

Derek I left the air force and married. Televisions were just coming on to the market and I became a TV repair man. This was the late 50s. The government set up a 12-month residential course in Letchworth, Hertfordshire. I learnt that if we were married we would be entitled to a married allowance and I put the situation to Yvonne – a most romantic proposal.

Yvonne My mother was taken aback at the speed of our decision and asked, 'you're not pregnant are you?' We were married at Fordham.

Derek From Letchworth we went to Reading but a lack of accommodation brought us back to Fordham. I decided we would build a house as we couldn't afford one and while doing my television rounds I came across this piece of ground in Reach. Originally, it had a cinema housed in a shed but the old boy who owned the site was told to take the shed down. We paid £300 for the land. We helped the builder by stacking bricks and mixing concrete and the house took less than a year to build. It was a requirement then that the bricks and tiles were comparable to other buildings in the village, but stipulations have relaxed since.

In 1968 the sewerage works were built. I knew the works were coming so I had a T-junction fitted to the piping of the septic tank. Every so often, I would remove the bung from the T-junction and send my 'poo' down to the works. I always wondered if the sudden rush was ever noted. Eventually I collared a sewerage worker and asked if we could be connected, he was delighted, as they wanted to increase the capacity!

Being a TV technician, I was much in demand but I got itchy feet. As a result, I joined the Home Office as a Communication Engineer looking after their electronics systems.

After a while, I was seconded to the Foreign Office (for some adventure) and they sent me to Amman Jordan. Fortuitously this posting allowed us to rent the house out, which helped pay the mortgage. We lived in Jordan for four years and Egypt for another two years, the both of us and our two children. The children at times boarded at Culford and Kings, Ely. We enjoyed the assignment extremely and lived, dined and entertained royalty and ambassadors.

We returned to England and the Home Office. Thatcher threatened to close the department I was in so I went on to the job market and worked at the Science Park, Cambridge, looking after satellite tracking systems. Happily I'm now retired.

We enjoy walking. I had a heart scare 15 years ago and this involved a stay at Papworth and having a stent fitted. I was advised to undertake a strenuous half hour walk every day; to really put my heart under pressure. And this I have done. So you will often see Yvonne and myself walking in Reach Wood.

Yvonne We have two children, Lesley and Anthony and co-incidentally they both live in Derbyshire. We have four grandchildren two boys and two girls all still at school.

We have lived in Reach since 1965 when the house was built. There was little transport in the village in the early days and certainly no parking issues. The village centre has changed, and the school that was has closed. The pub has changed hands and the shop and post office closed. Despite the loss of some facilities it seems that people now are making the village better in lots of ways and it seems that if there's a project people will get together and make it happen – like Reach Wood, the one-time ownership of the public house and the Fair is better now. The village has a lot going for it.

We like travelling and go away two or three times a year but not quite so far now. We have friends in America and have been several times and like to fly/drive. We find places to visit like Death Valley and mining towns.

We like walking and reading. Derek likes factual books and documentaries. I like Downton Abbey and murder mysteries. Derek has been flying on and off since the age of 15, when he first flew a glider solo and has flown up until recently.

Both The secret to a good marriage is: give and take. Moreover, the secret to a good life is: Be happy. Enjoy yourself as much as you can while you can.

Days Gone By

The outstanding No. 1 in June/July 1983 was "Every Breath You Take" by The Police - an English rock band formed in London in 1977. For the majority of their history, the band consisted of Sting (lead vocals, bass guitar, primary songwriter), Andy Summers (guitar) and Stewart Copeland (drums, percussion).



The Police became globally popular in the late 1970s and are generally regarded as one of the first new wave groups to achieve mainstream success, playing a style of rock influenced by punk, reggae, and jazz. They disbanded in 1986, but reunited in early 2007 for a one-off world tour that ended in August 2008.

In the UK, Margaret Thatcher's Conservative Party won a landslide second term election victory, taking 397 seats to Labour's 209. The SDP Liberal Alliance, fighting its first national contest, won just 23 seats under the "first-past-the-post" electoral system, despite receiving nearly as many votes as Labour.



The prime minister said her first priority for the new term would be to reshuffle her cabinet. She insisted it would reflect a range of political views, saying, "I haven't been extreme for the last four years and I'm not extreme now."

Defeated Labour Party leader Michael Foot described the result as a tragedy for the country. Mr Foot strongly attacked the SDP for siphoning support away from Labour - giving more seats to the Conservatives. He resigned later that year.

The SDP Liberal Alliance blamed Britain's "winner takes all" electoral system on its failure to convert its significant electoral support into seats in parliament.

Among the reasons behind the Conservative Party's success was Mrs Thatcher's popularity after Britain's victory in the Falklands war and the continuing troubles of a divided Labour Party.

Two of original "gang of four" who left Labour to set up the SDP, Shirley Williams and William Rodgers, lost their seats in the 1983 poll but the biggest upset was in Bristol East, where former minister Tony Benn was defeated after 33 years in the Commons.

In Reach, the Fair attendance was hit by appalling weather and villagers were also berated by Kay Pote, the editor of Out of Reach for not supporting the village events in what, in those days, was Fair "Week".

Also in the magazine were a couple of letters which related to the General Election with Jenny Johnson putting a strong case for voting for parties that do not support the locating of Cruise missiles in the UK.

There were District Council elections taking place too with Margaret Cook (Conservative) winning easily. The turnout in Reach was nearly 90%.

There was also a new Village Centre Committee in place which consisted of 5 Officers (including Ray and Anita Folkes - with Harvey Harrison being the Chairman) plus 7 committee members so 12 altogether. If you have a look at page 8 you'll see that Grahame is asking for more help on the current Village Centre Committee so please do volunteer if you can.



And there was cricket on the Green!

Names I recognise from the 22 that played are Tony Jordan, John Reed, Ray Folkes, Glyn Newman, Michael Aves, David Blocksage, Mike Greenhill and Justin Moseley. It was played with a soft ball to allay the fears of Fair Green residents. Hopefully next month we can see what the result was.

Food Focus Steph Davis' Homemade Granola



This is my favourite new start to the day. I first sampled it at Lucy's, my lovely sister-in-law's house and since then I've been making it regularly. People do look at the jar in the kitchen firstly in slight awe, then secondly concern that I have too much time on my hands. But if you are a granola fan – I challenge you to make it once, see how easy and delicious it is and let me know if you can go back to buying granola... As you will see the sweeteners in the recipe are maple syrup (apparently the lowest natural GI sugar), vanilla essence and cinnamon. The sugar police would probably say "it's still sugar", but it makes me feel better that there is no refined sugar in it.



The other benefit of it, if you can pull it off without looking too smug or like too much of a homemade yogurt knitter, is that it looks beautiful in a kilner jar as a present.

Stephs Favourite Version

"After you've made this recipe once or twice, you'll realize it's perfectly fine to add or modify things (for example, use different nuts, add sunflower flax or pumpkin seeds, or substitute some apple juice for some of the wet ingredients)

Preheat oven to 150°C (I like my granola a little browned – if you like yours less browned, you can set the oven to 120°C or 135°C). To be honest this isn't a precise science 170°C for 20 or 25 minutes is also fine. The recipe is in American cups which could be annoying if you don't have a "tala cooks dry measure". I'm delighted to have finally found a use for mine as I had no idea what an American cup measure was. Another tip which reduces the expense a bit is that I buy the big bags of almonds and cashews from the Indian food section in certain Tescos (Milton / Fulborne).

4 cups rolled oats (jumbo are better)

1 cup raw almonds (you can use slivered)

1 cup cashews

1 cup walnuts

1 cup coconut flakes (you can use shredded dry coconut – or one from the fair if you won one!)

1/3 cup maple syrup


1/3 cup safflower oil (I use rapeseed)

3/4 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon cinnamon

1 tablespoon vanilla

1 cup raisins (to be added after baking)



Mix up the dry ingredients in a large bowl. Measure out the maple syrup and rapeseed oil and mix with the vanilla essence (I use the tala measure again). Pour the wet mix over the dry ingredients and mix together well. Spread the wet granola over two large baking sheets – obviously the more you spread it out, the faster it will bake and dry out. Check on it occasionally, stirring it around the sheets with the wooden spoon and bake for around an hour. I let it bake just until the nuts and oats are very very slightly browned. Take out the sheets and let them cool for about 10 minutes. Now sprinkle the raisins over the granola. When it's fully cool, transfer it to a sealable container or ziplock bags.

Snakehall Farm

Excitingly we are on the brink of seeing some of Snakehalls' best produce. I eagerly await their broad beans and new potatoes - the perfect stop-gap until ours emerge. Don't miss out on their mange tout - so delicious, crunchy and fresh that they barely make it onto plates in this house. Get them while you can! The colourful and spicy salad bags are starting to become a regular in the farm fridge, along with the bagged herbs. Soon enough they will be joined by spinach, Swiss chard and French beans. Yellow and red cherry tomatoes, beefsteak and the standard matina are all busy ripening as I type and will be available shortly. Co-workers will start to harvest my favourite vegetable, beetroot, before too long too. The farm shop also always has free range and organic eggs and will continue to stock lovely cut flowers at amazing prices.

1. Forum for members of the public

Residents attended the meeting to discuss the planning application - 16/00130/FUL.

2. Declarations of Interest

Councillor Aves declared an interest in the planning discussion 16/00130/FUL.

3. Planning Application

Planning Application - 16/00130/FUL.

A discussion took place; the following points will again be made by the PC to the ECDC planning department.

- The site is outside the development envelope.
- The village does not want to lose stabling and paddock land.
- Concern that pre-emptive work is taking place
- It is isolated from the main village which goes against National Planning policy.
- The Parish Council is concerned that this will set a precedent for further, similar building around the village creating village sprawl.
- In July 2015 the previous owner of the land was told by Oliver Cook, Housing development and enabling officer that he could not be positive about the suitability of this site for residential development due to the location and rural character of the site.
- The site is not considered to be well related to the village, it would be viewed as an isolated site from the existing built form of the village. The character and nature of this part of Reach is clearly countryside, and therefore such a build would harm the character, setting and surrounding countryside given the rural nature and appearance of the site.
- The PC would ask that this application is refused. And that if approval is being considered the application goes before the Full Planning Committee.

Councillor Alderson to check with ECDC planning regarding their policy on the installation of cesspits.

Planning Application – 15/01558/OUT – no comment made.

1. Forum for members of the public

George Gibson attended the meeting to discuss the fire at The Dykes End Pub. The fire started in the early hours of the morning at the back of the kitchen. Nobody was hurt. The kitchen suffered extensive smoke damage. The pub will be trading for drinks only for the next couple of months until the repair work can be completed. The kitchen area may be extended whilst the repair work is carried out. Plans to be supplied to the PC prior to this going ahead. **Clerk** to contact the fair committee to highlight a possible toilet problem for Reach Fair.

4. Minutes of Previous Meeting

The Minutes of the previous Parish Council meeting were signed as correct.

5 (1) Amenity Fund Committee

Funding for the beacon for the Queen's birthday celebration had been agreed £225.

5 (2) County Councillor's Report

Full Council met on 22nd March. As has been widely reported, the longest debate surrounded the offer of a devolution deal from Government to Cambridgeshire, Peterborough, Norfolk and Suffolk. Following a lengthy debate a motion indicating that CCC found the deal on offer was unacceptable and should be rejected pending further discussions. This was agreed with 64 votes in favour and 1 abstention. Two other motions were also agreed, one highlighting the need for work to tackle deprivation in parts of the County, and the other calling on Government to come up with a system for intervening in failing academies. Council also agreed to change the process for oral questions at Council meetings so that in future they can be directed towards any member of Council holding a position of responsibility.

The Children and Young People Committee met on 8th March. A new strategy for Looked after Children was agreed. Following news that Greenwood Dale Trust was withdrawing from sponsoring the new secondary and special schools in Littleport, the Committee agreed to name Active Learning Trust as our preferred sponsor for these 2 new schools.

General Purposes Committee also met in March. Amongst other issues, the Committee agreed to start a Total Transport Pilot, bringing together the various public-funded transports around Ely. The Committee also agreed to defer a paper regarding IT provision for members and agreed a land transfer with Sawston Village College to enable a community hub to be built.

I also attended a meeting regarding the proposed expansion of Bottisham Village College.

5 (3) District Councillor's Report

£122,000 rural grant. ECDC have been awarded this grant by central government and it will be administered by the Commercial Services Committee which discussed it at the March meeting.

Its details are as follows. It will be divided equally between 42 parishes giving each parish £2904. The grant can be spent on initiatives that benefit the community and each parish will be required to submit an annual report to ECDC to show how the money has been spent. If a group of parishes want to join together to spend the money on a larger project this would be proved by ECDC. The spending of the grant is not time related. ECDC is waiting to hear when it will receive the money.

Swoffham Prior Community Land Trust Houses. The first of these 8 properties are ready for occupation. This is a district council initiative and it is hoped to have many more sites within the district, creating housing that is affordable for people on modest income. It is a fact that ever more young people can only afford to rent, so it is our duty to provide for them. According to the Halifax house price survey in 2001 the average house cost 3.2 times the average wage, today it is 5.5 times. In Cambridge during the last 20 years the average house price has increased 414%. The cost and availability of houses is fast becoming our greatest social issue.

5 (4) Financial Report

At year end the Parish Council remains in a financially stable situation. With a potential result figure nearly £2,000 better than forecast.

5 (5) Parish Council Members Meetings

There were none.

5 (6) Play Spaces

All look fine and were being well used over the Easter hols, although there may be a problem with one of the goalposts on the playing field.

Still waiting to hear back on the playground improvement ideas.

5 (7) Rights of Way

A resident has arranged a delivery of hard-core to byway 11, by the 24Acres, in conjunction with CCC. No response had yet been received from CCC regarding the hard-core at the Chapel Lane end of the same byway.

5 (8) Village Centre

Montessori nursery will be starting Monday 11th April. And we have arranged to re-tarmac the surrounds of the Hall. The new dishwasher has been installed.

5 (9) 24Acres Committee Report

An updated management plan had been received. This will be discussed at the next meeting. Following the resignation of Councillor Thomas from the PC he has offered to continue as liaison between the PC and 24Acres committee. The PC would very much appreciate this and accepted the offer. **Councillor Cane** to inform David Thomas.

A Reach Riders event had raised £265. Insurance is in place for a riding club. A gate is required to lock the area, as it will be for members only.

5 (10) Friends of Reach Wood

Nothing to report.

5(11) Local Plan

Report below/attached.

6 Streetlights

A document had been received regarding the transfer of the heritage lights from CCC to PC ownership. The PC are not willing to go ahead with this until the lamps had been changed. The PC would also like the document to name the parties involved correctly.

7 Computer Grant

The PC had received a small grant, as part of the Transparency code, to allow the PC to purchase a laptop and printer which will be PC owned. **Clerk** to go ahead and make the purchase.

8 24Acres water pipe

A water pipe and 2 taps are to be installed on the 24Acres for the cricket club and for village functions. A grant will be applied for, with the cricket club paying the match funding. The PC was in agreement.

9. Mowing contract

The PC are happy with the service of the present contractor. Prices for the next financial year show an increase of 50p per cut. The 24Acres orchard will only be cut on request and that the paths through the wood should be cut as requested/instructed by Nick Acklam. The PC agreed this increase. **Clerk** to ensure the contractor liaises with the 24Acres committee and will issue the contract.

10 The Queen's birthday beacon

A risk assessment had been received from the Events Team. The PC requires more information before giving this event the final go ahead. This document is required by Sunday 10th April, to allow for it to be reviewed and agreed. A full method statement and Risk assessment is required for the entire event from the installation to the dismantling after the event. The document is required to show details of exactly what will be happening, it should include but not exclusively the following. A event plan or time line and who has ownership of the event, names and full details of fire marshals and 1st aiders and all volunteers, details of water supply and fire extinguishers, full details of who will be managing the event and who will be in charge of each area, who are the key people.

11 War memorial Insurance

To insure the war memorial for the full replacement value will cost the PC an additional £100. The PC decided that the extra cost would be paid as it was felt that residents would want the memorial to be protected. **Clerk** confirm with the insurance company.

12 Annual Parish Meeting

The APM usually take place after the May PC meeting. However it was felt that because the PC meeting was on the 4th May two days after the Fair, it would be better attended later in the month. **Clerk** to establish another date with required attendees.
