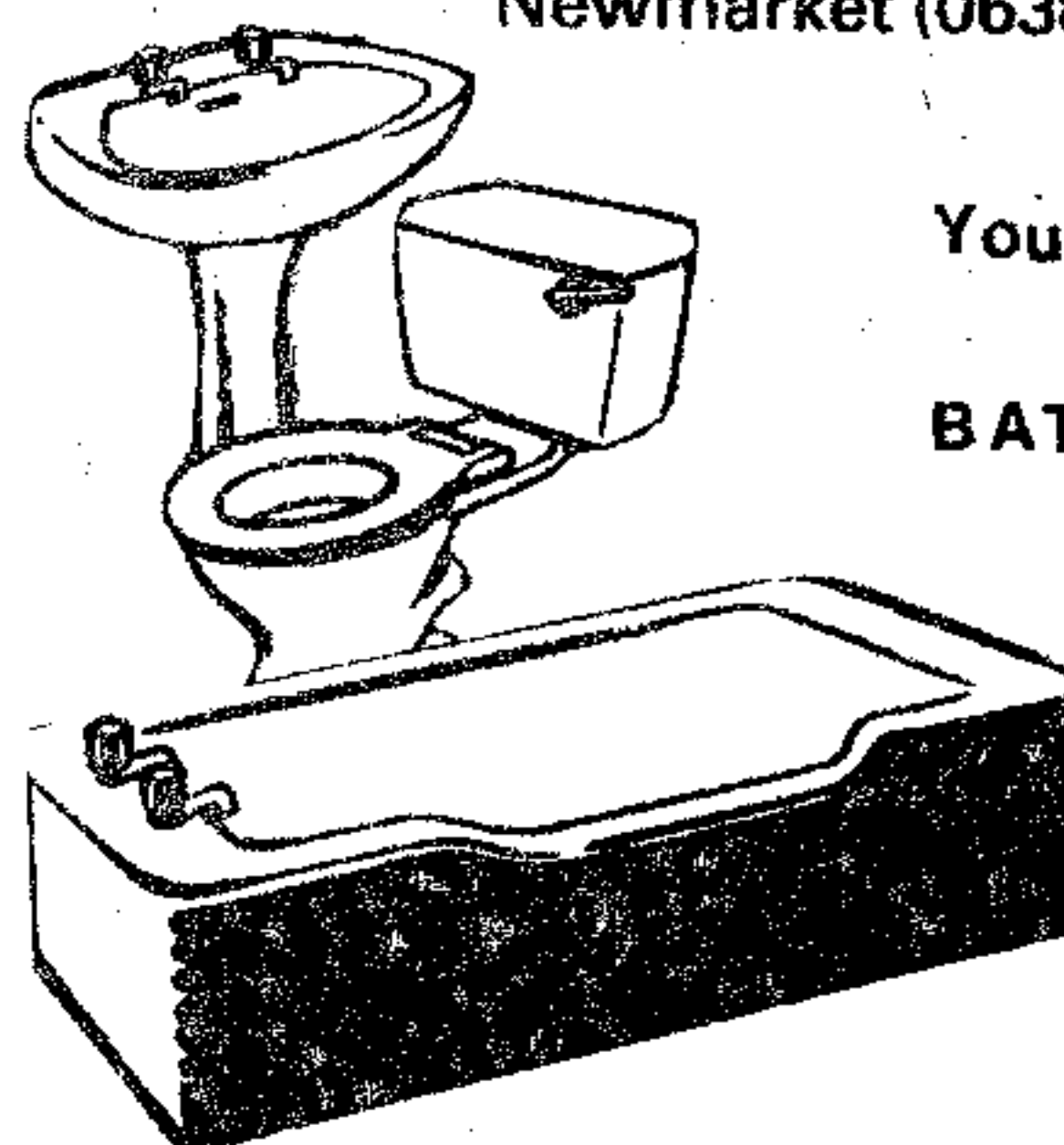

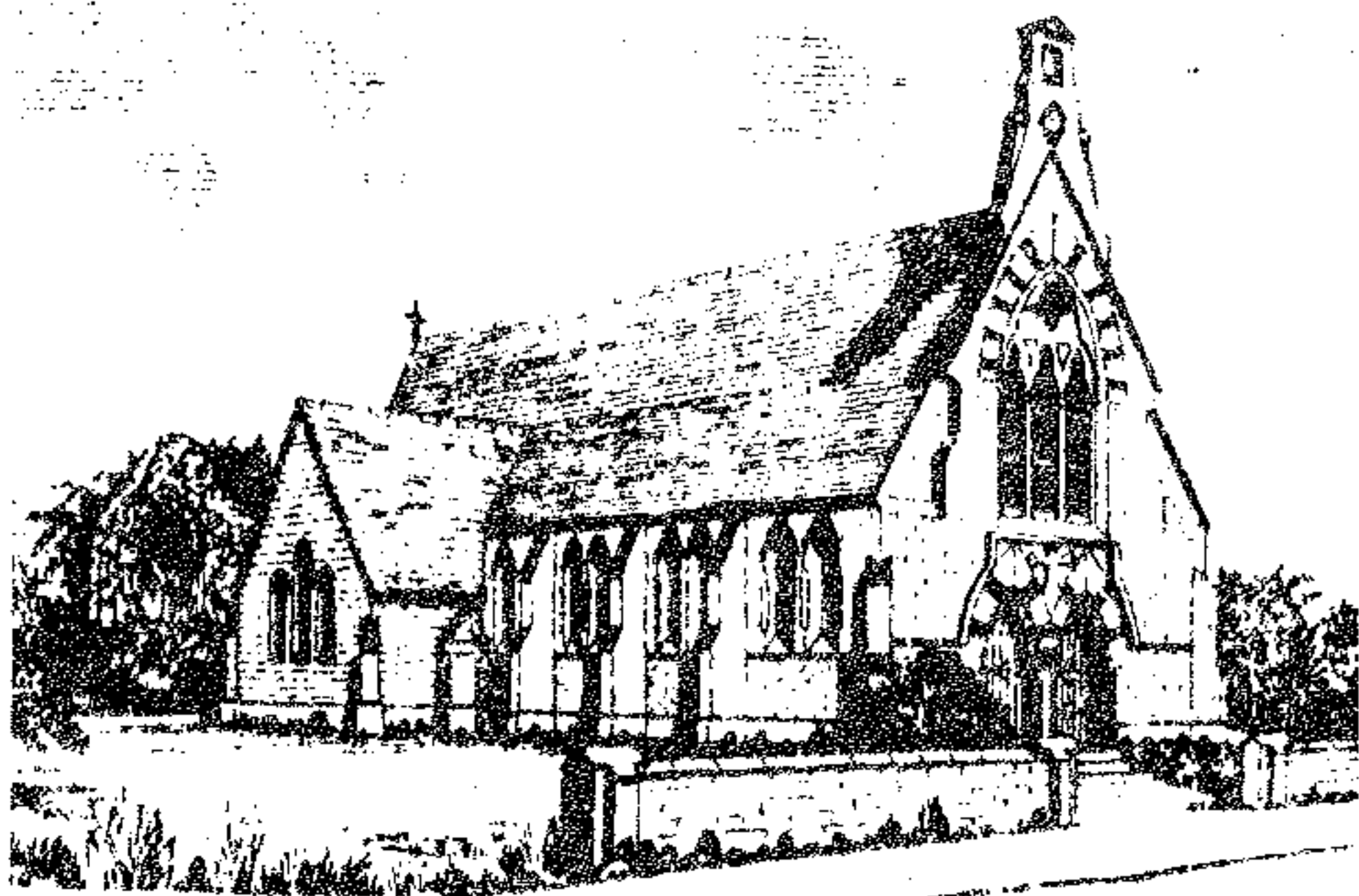

# *St. Etheldreda and the Holy Trinity*

*Reach*

**FROM THE VICAR**

Part of the 'small print', as we call it these days, otherwise known as rubrics or rules, of the Old Prayer Book, states that 'the Curate that ministereth in every parish-church or chapel, being at home, and not being otherwise reasonably hindered, shall say (Morning and Evening Prayer) in the parish-church or chapel, where he ministereth, and shall cause a bell to be tolled there unto a convenient time before he begin, that the people may come to hear God's Word, and to pray with him'.

Morning and Evening Prayer are one of the precious fruits of the English Reformation, originally compiled by Archbishop Cranmer for the first English Prayer Book of 1549. Drawn from the eight monastic services said every three hours through the day and night, they are each built around two substantial portions of scripture, the first from the old, the second from the New Testament. They are in English instead of Latin, so that all may understand them; and they are two in number - instead of eight, so that any member of the parish wishing to hear the Word of God on a week-day may go and do so. There is nothing quite like them in all Christendom. So it occurred to me while visiting the other day that as I have been saying, or rather praying, these two services regularly for more than forty years it might be worth while trying to say something about the place of scripture in the life of the Church and the individual Christian.

As a useful starting-point we might take a remark by John Habgood, the new Archbishop of York, in his recent book, *Church and Nation in a Secular Age*: 'in the last resort .... truth is public truth' (p.62). The scriptures are the public truth of the Gospel by which the Church lives, and which the Church herself wrote for the guidance of later ages, under the inspiration of the Spirit bearing his witness to Jesus.



That sounds rather tame. In reality, the process by which the scriptures of the New Testament came to be written (to limit ourselves to these) was nothing short of traumatic. The impact of the personality, ministry, teaching, death and resurrection of Jesus was an earth-quake human experience, strictly incomparable with anything that has occurred before except the Exodus from Egypt in the 13th Century B.C., the fall of Jerusalem in 586B.C. or the return from exile in Babylonia in 520B.C. These scriptures bear abundant traces of having been written, not in comfortable leisure, but at white heat, to such an extent that they actually create new language; for they are not simply memoirs of a past life receding into the distance, but interpretations of a life and work thought and felt to be still continuing. And both the pressure and the enabling light under which they were written were so great that in writer after writer there is a feeling of the human mind actually liquifying to receive a faithful impress of the divine mind itself.

But whatever precisely happened, the result is now a body of writings, so dense, so crammed with meaning, that a whole span of a man or women's life, or a whole century of the Church's corporate life is sufficient to scratch no more than the surface of a fragment of them. So it was a stroke of genius on Cranmer's part to devise such a way of feeding the Church's mind at the parish level every day of the year.

Fortunately, we don't have a bell in St Mary's, otherwise you would have to listen to it summoning you to prayer each morning and evening. But the services are said, nonetheless, for they are the iron rations of the priest's life and mind, and food for the laity no less. They can even be prophetic in their impact, since, under the providence of God, one frequently hears, in psalm, lesson or prayer, the very word from God one most needs to hear for that day and hour. Words leap from the page to move the heart, the mind, or the will; to inform, invite, warn or console. 'My words are spirit, and they are life', Jesus said. 'I have treasured up the words of his mouth', Job said, 'more than my necessary food'.

### THIS MONTH'S RECIPE

#### HOME MADE FAGGOTS

Mince or finely chop 1½ lbs of pigs liver, ½ lb fat pork and 2 medium onions. Put into a saucepan with salt and pepper to taste, and a few finely chopped herbs such as basil, thyme and sage.

Cover and cook very slowly for 30 minutes without allowing the mixture to brown. Drain off excess fat and allow to cool. Beat 2 eggs and add in sufficient soft breadcrumbs to make a stiff mixture. Mix with the meat, season with a little nutmeg, form into balls and wrap each in a piece of pig's caul. Put into a baking tin, pour over some gravy and bake until browned in a moderate oven.

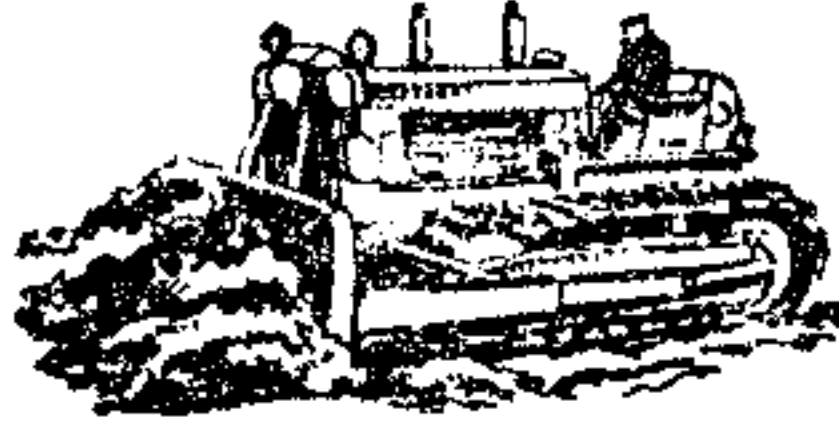

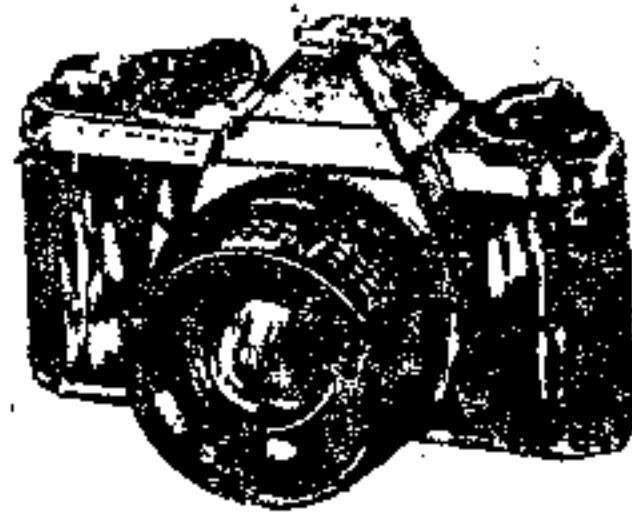
