FROM THE VICAR

I thought it might be worth considering the remark of the woman caught by the T.V. camera outside Durham Cathedral after a service on Easter Sunday at which David Jenkins, the new Bishop, had been preaching. In answer to a request for her reactions she said (roughly); "well, of course, you can't prove the resurrection; you just have to believe". Put like that, the case for the resurrection sounds hopeless, whistling in face of the facts; or, as the schoolboy said, explaining the meaning of faith, "believing what you know isn't true". But I want to suggest that the precise opposite is the case; proof is actually a dead thing, while faith is always living and growing; or, as the Bishop himself put it, "the resurrection is neither to be pinned down, nor wholly proved. It is to be lived by faith in the God who raised Jesus from the dead and who does and will raise us up with him".

Our technological age is obsessed with the need for proof, and at the level of technology it is vital. We have to be absolutely certain, not merely hopeful, that a particular mechanism will always work, if properly cared for. But proof at personal levels doesn't work in quite this way, nor can it be looked for. It is possible to prove that 2 & 2 make 4, though I believe the proof itself is unexpectedly complicated. But what is the value of the proof even when you have it? Though exciting to a 5-year-old on first discovery, it quickly becomes a static piece of the mind's furniture, to be brought into play, almost subconsciously, when required; part of the mechanism of existence, as it were.

At the level of personal relationships, however, such tests are difficult to apply; indeed, it is significant that they are most appropriate at the level of the law-court, where

distrust, not trust, in human testimony is at a premium. The more personal the level the less appropriate it becomes. When a youth, for example, puts pressure on a girl to sleep with him as a 'proof' of her love, he merely succeeds, first, in insulting her with his distrust, and secondly, in proving, not her love, but her desperate anxiety not to lose him. At a still higher level, you can't 'prove' the existence of God theoretically; and no-one should wish to, for the simple reason that, could one do so, he would necessarily be something lower and smaller than one's own mind, like a theorem in geometry. Proving, in the sense of becoming what David Jenkins would call 'overwhelmingly certain' of God's existence is by a completely different route, namely moral obedience; as Jesus said, "Come and see; do his will and you will know for yourself", i.e. in your heart and bones, not simply in the top of your head; or, as we say, tritely but profoundly, "try it and see". You find God's everlasting arms beneath, supporting you only when you trust yourself to them, at real risk, as a swimmer only finds water supports by plunging in.

This is why faith is a living, growing thing, where mere proof is dead. For the experiment of trusting one's life (and sanity) to God in simple ongoing obedience is not a static and repetitive thing, but an ever-deepening exploration into certainty. More and more areas of human existence make sense on the supposition of belief in God; or, as David Jenkins put it in his sermon, one becomes "as certain of eternal life (coming from God) as of death". The knowledge of God grows slowly and gradually, though sometimes by sudden leaps, precisely in the way that knowledge of another human mind and heart grows, through constantly renewed trust. Even on the human level we find another mind virtually unfathomable; (this is why it is so deeply offensive to say to anyone "I can read you like a book"); where Christ is concerned, the new treasures of wisdom and power to be discovered in this trusting way are endless. (This is why James Burke's method of contrasting religion and science in his current T.V. serial is merely trite).

The growth of faith towards certainty is strangely similar to an ascending fraction; you can ascend from one half to two-thirds, $\frac{3}{4}$, and so on without ever actually reaching the whole number One. By the same token, you grow continually in certainty about God as known in Christ without ever quite reaching the point where you have him taped. As St. Paul said, we have to be content to "be known rather than to know". As a great physicist said, "Christian worship sustains an eternal, never to be consummated hunch". Each act of worship takes you a fraction further. "He that believes in God goes into God", Augustine said. The more you believe, the deeper you go, and you go on delving deeper, endlessly. Proof becomes an almost unintelligible irrelevance: what matters is the

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S NOTES FOR APRIL 1985

The period between the last formal County Council meeting, which agrees the budget and rates for the year ahead, and the County Council elections in May is normally quiet and free from interesting County Council news items. However, this time there has been all sorts of activity - not all of it very productive.

There is the on-going strike actions by some of the teachers' unions, and the terrible frustration that so little can be done locally because of the peculiarly rigid national system for fixing their pay. Some local exploratory meetings have been initiated by the Education Chairman, John Horrell, with the County secretaries of the teachers' unions, but their outcome is unclear.

There is, too, the continuing tragi-comedy of traffic and road management inside Cambridge City. However, this makes the sort of headlines beloved by our local press, and, as well as having been more than adequately publicised already, there can be no major decisions until the new Council is in being.

Perhaps the most newsworthy happening has been the fiasco of the "special" County Council meeting called by the leaders and members of the Labour and Liberal parties especially to reprimand the Chief Constable for issuing car stickers to local residents in the Molesworth area to facilitate access to their homes during the expected Easter demonstrations. great expense in time and money, all 68 members from all over the county were called to debate and pass a motion which requested the Home Secretary to instruct the Chief Constable to undo what he had already done.

There was no other item of business.

The actual debate was better than it might have been in the circumstances and, eventually, after several amendments had been voted down a Conservative member proposed an amendment which approved the Chief Constable's action in issuing the car stickers and also approved what he was doing to discuss and co-operate with CND, in order to reduce the risk of problems during the Easter period. This was carried by an overwhelming majority of councillors, partly because one or two members of the opposition parties had the good sense to vote with the Conservative members, but mainly because a number of opposition councillors, having called the meeting, were not even there to vote.

So all we had to show for a wasted morning was a quite unnecessary formal approval of what was happening anyway!!

In the outcome, the Easter weekend went off much more peaceably than most of the Molesworth residents had dared to hope, thanks to good preliminary organisation and the good sense shown by both the demonstrators and the Police.

This month's Recipe - RICH CHOCOLATE FLAN

Line 8" flan ring with 6oz shortcrust pastry. Prick base.
Bake blind 200°C, 400°F, Mark 6, for 10-15 mins.
Place gelatine and cold water in a basin, leave 10 minutes
to soften. Pour on boiling water and stir until dissolved.
Break up chocolate and place in a bowl over a pan of hot,
not boiling water. Stir until dissolved and gradually stir
in the hot gelatine mixture. Separate eggs. Whisk egg yolks
and sugar together over a pan of hot water until thick and
light. Stir in chocolate mixture and leave in a cool place
until on the point of setting.
Whisk egg whites until stiff, fold into chocolate mixture
and pour into baked flan case. Leave to set completely.
Pipe or spoon swirls of whipped cream on to flan.
Decorate with After Eight Mints if liked.
