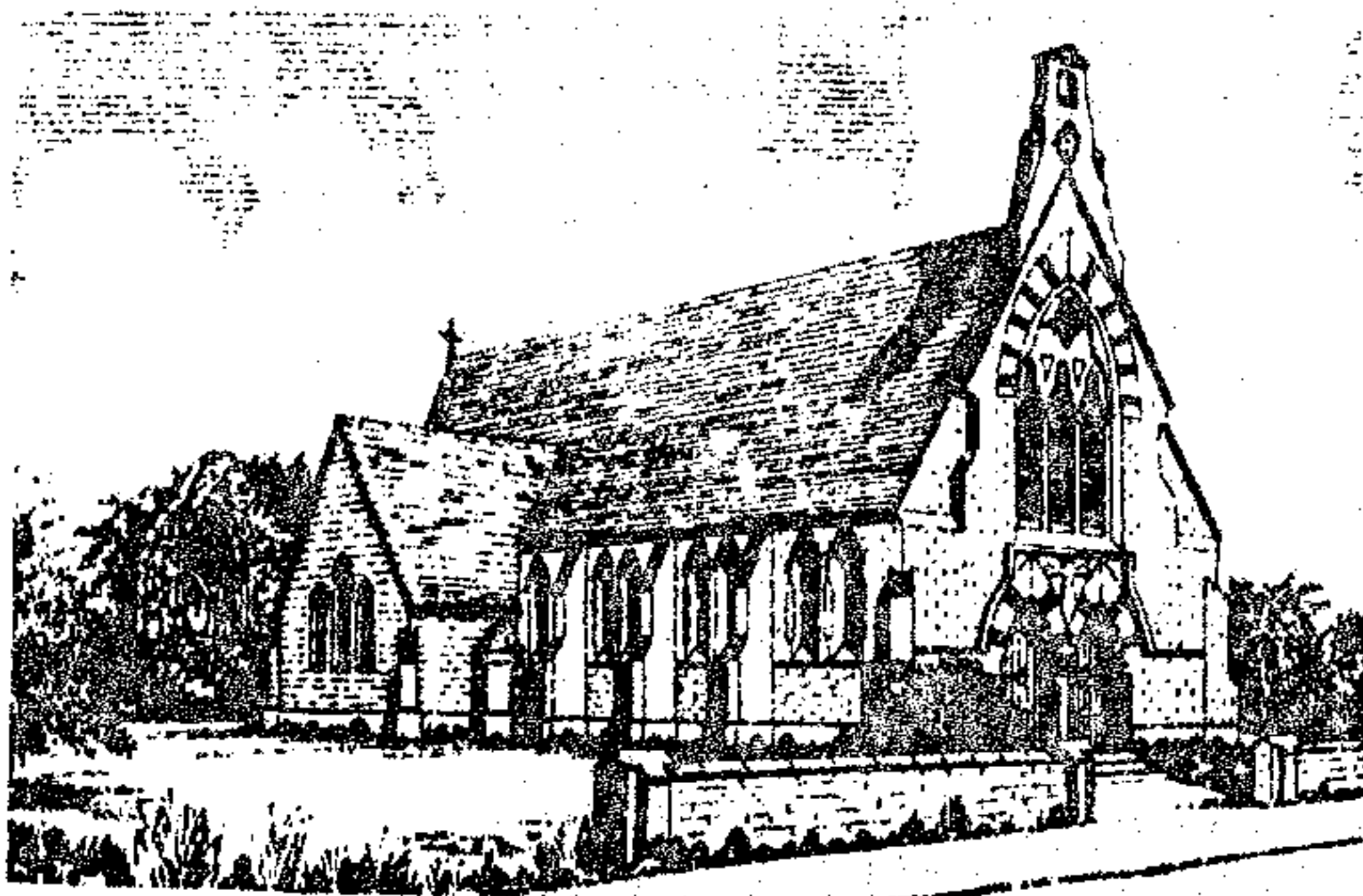

FROM THE VICAR

There is a strong movement afoot, within the provinces of the Anglican Church, to make baptism, not Baptism plus Confirmation, the sole condition of admission to Communion. 'An international Anglican Consultation which met in Boston, U.S.A., recently, has called on all provinces to admit children to Communion from infancy on the basis of their baptism'. So we read on the front page of the Church Times at the end of August.

This may seem strange to some of you, even a regrettable lowering of standards. But this is not the case. For centuries Baptism alone was the normal means of admission to full rights of membership, in particular participation in the Eucharist. The way in which Confirmation came to take the place of Baptism is a simple matter of history.

Confirmation represents the final blessing and anointing by the bishop after the candidate had been baptized, - the gifts of Baptism being membership of the church, the forgiveness of sins, and the bestowal of the Holy Spirit for guidance grew in size, what began to happen is the kind of thing we are all familiar with today: candidates baptized by the local clergy then gathered together to receive the final confirmation, or seal of blessing, by the bishop.

In the early Middle Ages, however, there came a point when the Pope gave permission for the local clergy to administer Confirmation themselves, thus restoring the old unity. But after a few centuries this permission was withdrawn, and Confirmation limited once more to the Bishop, thus being erected into a separate sacrament, and incidentally made the final entre to Communion at the altar. But Confirmation conveys no essentially new gift, merely a supplementing and sealing of what has already been given. The case for making Confirmation a final, and for many people, a very large hurdle, before attendance at the altar is allowed, is now seen to be less and less defensible.

In England, particularly at the present time, we are in the wretchedly unsatisfactory position of huge numbers baptized in infancy or childhood, but not confirmed, and deeply alarmed at the thought of undergoing six months instruction before Confirmation. Multitudes are thus denied the Bread of Life, the life Jesus sacrificed for us on the Cross, and promised us in 'the breaking of the bread', the earliest name for the Lord's Supper, Eucharist, Mass, Holy Communion.

We therefore need to be working towards a situation in which, with the eucharist now re-established over the past 50 years in its old central place in the Church's life, children are encouraged to attend it as the most normal thing in the world, as many already do, and then begin to make their Communion when their understanding of the meaning of the eucharist prompts them to ask for it. (If Confirmation is retained, it should be administered much later, not much before 18, when the boy or girl is ready to embark on fully adult responsibilities, providing an opportunity of re-affirming allegiance to Christ and the assurance of the Spirit's presence and power).

Here again, some of you may demur. It is hard to turn ones back on the mental habits of a lifetime. Yet this is just what the Spirit is constantly demanding of us, as He leads us into more and more truth in one sphere or another, not least in this one. One of the great discoveries of the past century, assisted before that by such poets as Wordsworth, has been the realisation of the astonishing potential of children in the realm of spiritual understanding; Dean Inge's daughter was talking to him about religion like an adult before she died at the age of four. For the key to such understanding, as the poet Blake saw, is not cleverness, but innocence; that luminous innocence which attracted so many of them so powerfully to Jesus, and whose understanding of the things relating to the Kingdom of God, Jesus said, was God-given. Nothing irritated him more than misguided adult efforts to keep children at a distance from him. Can we then continue to do just this, with our present clumsy stilted system, a system which keeps them away from the altar till many of them are cynical and bored. The very condition of entering the Kingdom, Jesus warned, was precisely the recovery of the childlike mind, i.e. an attitude of loving and exalted dependence. To be able to feed them with the bread of life from the age when they first become profoundly interested in receiving it might even mean the rebirth of the church.

"JUST SAY NO"

How much easier it is to say 'Just say no', than actually to say 'NO'!!

Current publicity surrounding the fight against drug abuse, spear headed by the Government, the B.B.C. and the Press, the local Health Authority and Local Government, puts the emphasis on saying 'NO', but for young people wishing to 'keep up' with their 'friends' or their peer group, it is so hard to say 'NO'.

The start of the school year is a good time to remind ourselves of the growing threat to our youngsters of illegal drug abuse. Drug taking starts when a child is offered a drug and accepts. Most children say 'NO' only a minority of those who say 'YES' go on to become regular users or addicts. In this article we are not considering alcohol or tobacco but drugs used illegally - heroin, cocaine, L.S.D., amphetamines, barbiturates or cannabis. It is not our intention to alarm you, but to alert you. Drug taking is not confined to any social class, and can hit any family. Most youngsters probably start from curiosity, or because their friends are doing it. Sgt. David Robinson of Cambridgeshire Police is what might be described as our local drug 'expert', and he has told us that he is "aware of young people in the Bottisham/Burwell/Soham areas who have, and do use cannabis". During last school year he was involved in a programme of Community College lectures; he found two important things - firstly, knowledge of what harm drugs can do is deplorably low among the 13-18 year olds, and secondly, one in four had either smoked cannabis or had been to a social event where this drug was available.

Some people will tell you that cannabis is not harmful. In our view, and the view of others with greater knowledge of drugs, cannabis is dangerous because it can so easily lead on to very harmful addictive drugs. We were horrified to learn, at a recent meeting of the East Cambs. Police Liaison Committee, from Sgt. Robinson, of the 'pusher' who offers an apparently harmless cannabis cigarette which has been 'spiked' with heroin - the unsuspecting victim can in this way become dependant on heroin before realising the risk.

It is a fact that three-quarters of Juvenile Crime is drug or alcohol related, leaving aside alcohol, a regular cannabis user may need 10gns. or more per month at a cost in excess of £30, so from where does he get the money - a stolen tape-recorder perhaps. The Cambridge Drug Squad arrested 462 persons for drug-related offences during 1984; another 165 have been arrested so far in 1985.

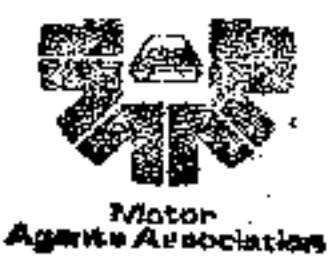
3 egg whites
pinch salt
8 oz. gran. sugar
 $\frac{1}{4}$ pt water
 $\frac{1}{2}$ pt fruit puree (you can use 6.5oz carton of
concentrated orange juice instead)
 $\frac{1}{2}$ pt whipping cream

Whisk egg whites with salt until it makes soft peaks.
In a small saucepan, dissolve the sugar in the water
over a low heat, then bring to boil and let it bubble
fiercely for 3 mins.

Pour sugar solution immediately in a thin stream onto
the egg whites, whisking all the time at high speed.
Whisk until it is like a stiff meringue mixture.
Whisk in fruit puree. Whisk cream until thick but not
stiff and stir gently into ice cream mixture. Pour
into a one litre container and freeze at least 5 hours
but preferably over night.

Note: fruit puree ice creams are best given half an
hour to soften before serving.

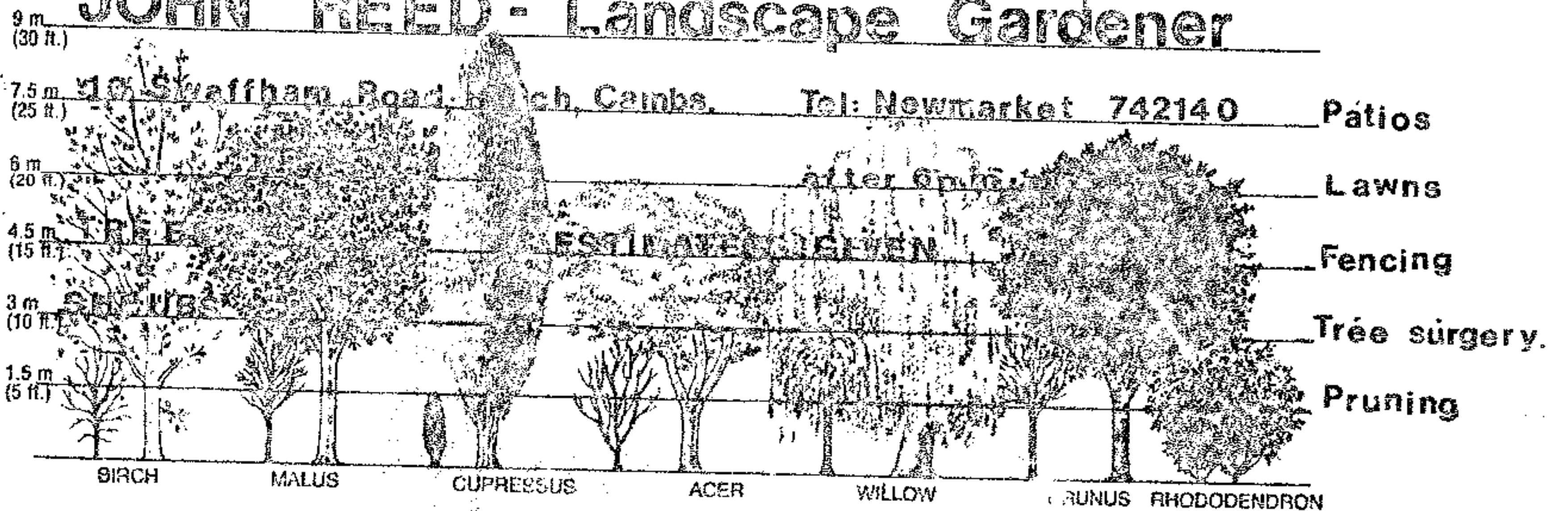
