



FROM THE VICAR

I wonder if contemporary historians will come to feel that in the course of last August, the 40th anniversary of Hiroshima, the mind of Englishmen, if not mankind generally, finally tilted away from the thought of nuclear war, even as a last resort. The repeated TV films on the subject of the war Game were so horrendous, yet so carefully factual, and so skilfully timed, that one seemed to emerge from them as from a nightmare, not only still roughly same, but determined, by the grace of God, to stay so believed as well as the waite of the state of

But it was surely not simply the prolonged dreadfulness of the inevitable aftermath that was burnt into the mind - the ruined soil, the nuclear winter, and the cycle of the earth's weather fatallt disrupted: darker perhaps than anything was the realistation that all this was not due to some attack from outer space, or a near collision of planets, but what the new Prayer Book calls out own deliberate fault and that though penitence might even than be acceptable to God, the laws within which he has framed creation are such that full ecological recocery might be decades, even centuries away. Oh, the pity of it.

Yes, 'Oh, the pity of it! . Yet it is worth remembering that such fruitless remorse is not reserved to *x reflection on a disaster we come tably hope will never happen, or only to monsters of wickedness: it is a possibility lurking in the depths of every life. For the Lord of the world has made us in the image of himself, rational, and possessed of sovereign, if damaged, freedom, with which it is possible to choose a course of life in which, at any moment, but always

sooner than we imagine, we realise we have passed the point of no return.

Choices harden. The rement Just Say No campaign has reminded us of the fact that choices harden into habits which quickly and stealthily master us, so that not only is it all too easy to reach the point of no return, but worse still, a point of what the New Testament calls 'no repentance', settled in that state of mind which says 'Evil, be thou my good!.

Jesus was quite explicit that there is a possibility of sin against the Spirit, the Holy Spirit, the guardian of our spirit, which has no forgiveness - as against all those sins against himself which, with characteristic generosity, he said were indeed forgiveable. He was warning us that is is possible to become so accustomed to 'calling good evil, and evil good, to use an Old Testament phrase, that when, in the end, we are finally offered forgiveness, we are simply unaware of what is being said. We cannot understand the language: we thought the evil we had loved was good. But the profound unveiling of our sight in the process of death proves otherwise. Hard doctrine yet the necessary condition of bearing the high destiny of being human spirits capable of freely choosing God or rejecting Him. 'Creator of the world, have mercy upon us'.

Church Flowers As one who spends many hours in St Mary's, I can testify to the extraordinary impression that beautiful flower arrangements, such as we are blessed With, make on the hundreds of visitors who pass through annually. It is asmost a ministry in itself they perform. Alas, two members of our Rota have to leave us this month, and to them, as to all members, we say a very warm Thank You. May I ask, therefore, if you could possible consider whether this is a service you might mo for us? We should be deeply grateful if so. FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

MONEY

Over the next few months all three party groups will be deciding how they would like to spend the next year's County Budget. There are likely to be conflicting strategies and different bids for favourite schemes. The County financial officers help by costing the various alternatives and reminding the elected members of known existing and future commitments around which part of the Budget will be built.

The strategy is founded on the Medium Term Plan which is a three year forecast of agreed spending which rolls forward one year at a time with a new third year being outlined to full the resulting gap. There is, thus, a financial discipline which, I believe, members support on the whole, while being prepared to dispute individual items.

At this stage in the cycle it is impossible to predict the outcome in any detail. Achievable goals will be clearer after Christmas when the Government tells us what grant we shall receive. Once that is clear, the outlines of the Budget will begin to emerge. The political decisions are bound to be difficult, not only because there will be many more desirable schemes put forward than we can possible afford, but also because of the three-way unequal balance on the Council. The Alliance administration is very clearly aware of the financial constraints.

They include:

- 1) Committed spending for year one of the three year plan montioned above;
- 2) The until Christmas unknown Government grant and any restrictions that may go with it;
- 3) How much the ratepayers can afford to pay in rates;
- 4) Continuing inflation at what level;?
- 5) Differing views between the three party groups on how much to spend and on what.

Nobody knows yet how it will all develop, but I would hazard one opimion that more money will be put into Education and Social Services. My opinion is based on the election results last May. Both Labour and Alliance groups made it clear in their manifestos that they wished to improve services in both, and you, the electorate, responded with your support.

My last comment is that in my six years as a District Councillor for East Cambridgeshire, I have tenaciously supported three targets: financial responsibility, value for money and the maintenance of essential and caring services. I intend to carry these views forward to the County.



DISTRICT COUNCIL NOTES

The District Council has recently sold its 1,000th house under the Government's 'Right-to-Buy) legislation. If one takes an average of £9,000 per house (the sale price is heavily discounted to 60%), this produces a roun! figure of £9 million.

Of this received capital, The District Council is allowed by Government to spend only 20% in any one year, 20% of the residue in the next and so on. This is known as "cascading" (D.O.E.) jargon, not mine. The remainder of this capital is earning interest which helps to swell the surplus in the Housing Revenue Account.

The sale of these houses has reduced the Council's housing stock by 16%-17% even allowing for annual new build. In the foreseeable future we anticipate an increased demand for family type dwellings, since those who have purchased, will not be available for transfer to smaller elderly persons dwellings, or to sheltered accommodation. Thus fewer family type accommodation will be released for those still on the waiting list. We have already detected an increased demand for family housing in the south of the District. In recent years the main thrust of the Council's new build policy has been toward providing increased accommodation for the elderly, and partnership schemes to give encouragement to first-time buyers, rather than to larger family-type dwellings.

The rents of these dwellings remaining in the Council's ownership have continued to rise in line with inflation and are set at just below the regional average.

This is what the government assumes in calculating the Council's needs when assessin it for grant related expenditure (G.R.E.) of the surplus (profit) in the Housing Revenue account, arising from the rents charged, and the interest on the capital from the sale of Council Houses, which we are not allowed to spend about 13% is transferred to the General Rate Fund, which helps to support other Council services from the refuse collection, to development control and environmental health matters. It is a judgement of Solomon as to how much it is reasonable to transfer from one account to the other in any one year, since we have to satisfy the District Auditor as to the reasonableness of our financial strategy at all times.





THIS MONTH'S RECIPE

Carbonade of Beef

2 tablespoons cooking oil 1½ lb stewing steak - trimmed & cubed 8oz onions - pecled & sliced 4 oz celery sliced 2tsp mixed herbs 1/2 pint stout beer 4 pint boiling water

Topping

4 slices French bread each approx 3" . 2 oz Red Leicester choose - grated & tossed in paprika

Pre-heat oven to 350°/180°C, Gas mark 4. Fry stewing steak and prepared vegetables in the oil in a pan until the meat is browned and vegetables beginning to soften. Transfer to a casserole dish. Stir in the herbs, beer and water. Cover & cook for 2 hours or until meat is tendor. Cover the slices of French bread with cheese & paprika. Float the bread slices on top of the casserole at the end of cooking time. Return dish to the oven for approx 5-10 mins until choese is melted & bubblibg over the bread. Serve with green vegetables & creamed potatoes.




