

FROM THE VICAR

The recent arrival of Herbert and Brenda Connor, with their daughter Karen, to take over the pub in Reach, is an event of no small significance in the ongoing life of the village. The fact that they have also come here after many years in a Lincolnshire village I happen to know well gives their arrival an added interest for me personally. We welcome them, and hope they will be happy with us.

The news that Mr Connor has the added skills of a builder, and his wife a fund of good ideas for improving the pub's appearance, should lead to some pleasant surprises for us, including, we hope, the much needed provision of pub lunches for those who value this deeply enjoyable form of mid-day relaxation.

Another surprise we look forward to is the name the pub will eventually bear. One hears various suggestions bandied about, and one wonders which, if any, of these will finally be approved. There is much in a name, and we hope it will be chosen carefully and unanimously.

This word 'unanimously' is perhaps the clue to what has been rumbling through my mind on the subject. A common mind is a precious thing, especially in a village, and the local pub is one of the key places in which such a mind is generated. But the process is mysterious, so complex and mysterious as to be 'out of reach', as the title of our village magazine reminds us. Yet it is so real as to be almost tangible; — and perhaps an outsider like myself may be allowed to voice the opinion that few influences have contributed more to the forming of a common mind than that magazine, for which we offer our grateful thanks to the editor and all who help her.

Next door but one to the pub, in a roughly northern direction, is a quaint building, erected to the honour of St Etheldreda and the Holy Trinity. I mention this for two reasons; and first because it

This is a pity because, to come to a second reason, another powerful influence in the creation of a common mind is the mind of Christ, worshipped week by week in the Breaking of the Bread on the altar. But there is something about that mind which is unlike amy other: so deep and lovely, so broad and strong, it can transcend and hold together all mere differences of opinion, so that while differing profoundly in opinion we can still rejoice in a common mind.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S NOTES FOR OCTOBER 1984

PARENTS AND SCHOOL GOVERNING BODIES

Recently this has been a major discussion subject among parent groups, teachers, school governors, local councils, local education authorities and national education conferences.

The reason was Sir Keith Joseph's green paper on parental involvement and the constitution of school governing bodies. The most revolutionary idea was for a built-in overall majority of parents elected by parents. There were other suggestions, some of them popular, but this one gave rise to almost unanimous opposition. There was general agreement for the need for greater parental involvement in some, but not all, schools and that this was not the way to go about it.

Some of the arguments went as follows:-

1. A very recent re-constitution of governing bodies would not come into effect until 1985. This increases parent and teacher representation and should be given a trial before yet another change.

2. Governors should be evenly representative of parents, teachers, the local education authority and the local community. No one group

should have overall power.

3. Community representation would be adversely affected and would be especially harmful at community schools. For example at present the Bottisham Village College governors include a nominee of each parish and district council. The proposals allowed for only one governor to represent the Community in the entire catchment area. 4. There would be lack of continuity, especially at those schools where pupils stayed for only 2 or 3 years.

There were other criticisms, but complete agreement that insufficient time had been allowed for consultation. All in all it is unlikely that the Secretary of State for Education will have been very pleased with the reaction to his ideas.

However, government "green" papers do not always become government "white" papers. Even "white" papers do not always become law. (Perhaps it should be pointed out that a "green" paper is issued by a government department as a consultation document, while a "white" paper sets out government policy.)

Samosas

Delicious pastry triangles filled with spiced meat and vegetables.

- 1 onion (finely chopped)
- Cakes, Croft; Books, Clothes and many others. Refreshments and Jow Acok
- 2 tablespoons curry paste or (if curry not liked) teaspoon mixed spice of teaspoon ground cuming teaspoon ground cuming the following teaspoon ground cuming the following teaspoon ground chilli powder
 - 1 2 cloves crushed garlic
 - 2 level tablespoons tomato purce
 - 1 tablespoon frozen peas (thawed)
 - 4 pint beef stock (made with 2 stock cube)

Dough

8 oz wholewheat flour 1 teaspoon baking powder pinch salt 6 tablespoons oil Oil for frying Water

Chop onion, grate carrot. Heat oil in pan and fry onion, carrot and meat until browned. Stir in curry paste (or spices), tomato purce, peas, stock and seasoning. Leave mixture to cool.

To make dough - sift flour, baking powder and solt together. Make a well in centre and gradually mix in about 8 fl oz water to make a firm dough. Knead for 5 minutes, then divide in 12. Roll out each piece to a circle, 4 inches in diameter. Cut each circle in half and brush the edges with water. Curl each semi-circle into a cone shape and pinch the edges together to seal. Spoon about 1 heaped tablespoon of the filling into the cone and seal the edges together well. Heat the oil in a deep pan and fry the Samosas, a few at a time for 3 - 4 minutes or until golden brown. Drain on kitchen paper and serve with a hot relish or chutney. If re-heating, place on a baking try and put in hot oven. (Mark 6 - 200° C - 400° F) for about 15 minutes.
